2006 Report Chairman's Statement

It is my pleasure as Chairman to present the Annual Report of Irish Water Safety for 2006, which has been a most successful year for a small Voluntary State Body, which has responsibility for Water Safety in this country. The report contains a comprehensive review of the many activities of Irish Water Safety undertaken by our volunteers and staff in an effort to make our maritime and inland waters safe, thus reducing drowning accidents. One of the measures of our success is that drownings for 2005 were the lowest recorded for many years, notwithstanding this we must strive to reduce it further.

One of the most significant events for all Irish Water Safety members during the year was the acceptance by Mrs. Mary McAleese, "President of Ireland" to become "Patron" of Irish Water Safety. Her great interest in our work and the humanitarian values we demonstrate in saving people from drowning "no doubt" influenced The President to accepting our invitation to become our Patron. The acclaim with which The President's acceptance was received by young and old within our Organisation was one of joy and pride. We sincerely thank The President for so honouring us by becoming our Patron.

During the year the term of office of the Council for the period 2003 to 2006 terminated and a new Council was appointed in July 2006 with two additional members. In conjunction with the appointments being made, a new Statutory Instrument (S.I. NO 389 of 2006) was given to the Council by the Minister of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government under which Irish Water Safety was to function. The effect of the new Statutory Instrument is to give clarification to duties and responsibilities of the Council in certain areas such as lifeguarding, rescue etc, and to bring the Irish name "Sabhailteacht Uisce na hEireann" into line with the near direct translation of Irish Water Safety.

This report also contains a comprehensive statement of our financial income and expenditure, which has been examined by the Comptroller & Auditor General. That so much is achieved by a small Organisation on a budget of less than "one million euro" and with a small staff, is a mark of the effectiveness of the work of the Council, its Commissions and supported by the members at local level in achieving its goals. The Council strives at all times to get value for money, but the high cost of pool hire and other necessary services to promote water safety are major factors in increased annual costs. Our staffing requirements will have to be addressed, at present we have a Chief Executive Officer with support staff of four, which is clearly not enough to service a vibrant expanding Organisation. Council has been compliant with all the necessary financial guidelines demanded of it by Government in relation to its financial activities. Our financial management is overseen by the Finance Commission (who report directly to the Council), by an independent Internal Examiner and also by our Firm of Accountants, R.J.Kidney & Co, Dublin.

Irish Water Safety through its expertise, leadership and dedication, provides an opportunity for the young of our community to learn swimming and lifesaving and this we do nationwide through a comprehensive summer and winter program. We provide them with the training to become lifesavers, instructors and lifeguards, and we give to them the skills necessary to save themselves and others involved in water related accidents. This we consider as a primary function of Irish Water Safety on this Island Nation of ours with such close proximity to water no matter where you are. We also provide these instructions under a comprehensive "Child Protection Code" of which we are very pleased to state was first put in place in 1995, being one of the first voluntary organisations to do so.

Sport is an essential part of training and development of youth in this country, this is acknowledged by Government. Irish Water Safety since its foundation in 1945 has always recognised this fact and therefore we play our part in this development through our national and international lifesaving sporting activities. Indeed, one of the most prestigious trophies to be competed for in sport in Ireland was presented by Uachtarán na hÉireann, Séan T O'Ceallaigh in 1950 and we are very proud that this trophy is competed for to this day and it stands as a testimony to the commitment of Irish Water Safety to fostering the development of the youth of Ireland through lifesaving sport.

With 30 Water Safety Area Committees, which includes one within An Gárda Siochana and the other within the Defence Forces, we are able to promote water safety nationwide to a very high standard. We also have excellent schools programme, whereby we involve the schoolteachers and this allows us (in most cases) to have children educated in water safety awareness at a very young age. This aspect of our work is on going and we hope to develop it further in the coming years.

Sadly, during the year we lost some of our most dedicated volunteers through illness and accidents and we express to their families and friends our sincere sympathy. The dedication to water safety of our deceased Colleagues will remain with us in Irish Water Safety throughout the years.

On the 13th June 2006 we learned of the passing of Mr. Charles J. Haughey. Mr Haughey was a Patron of International Life Saving having been proposed by the Founding President, Mr Kevin Weldon AM (Australia). Mr Haughey took up his appointment in 1993 and was present for the inaugural meeting of International Life Saving in Cardiff in 1994. He was one of several Patrons among the following world and distinguished figures which includes, H.R.H. King CARL XVI Gustaf of Sweden, H.E. Nelson MANDELA (South-Africa) - former President of South Africa, H.E. Seyed Mostafa MIRSALIM (Iran) - former Minister of Culture and Islamic Guidance, H.E. Robert J. HAWKE (Australia) - former Prime Minister, H.E. John MAJOR (United Kingdom) - former Prime Minister, H.E. Brian MULRONEY (Canada) - former Prime Minister, H.E. Michel ROCARD (France) - former Prime Minister, Dr. Dave WILLIAMS, MD (Canada) - Space Agency Astronaut. We extend to Mrs. Haughey and her family our sincere sympathy, "Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam".

The international dimension to water safety is a valuable one and at present we have membership of International Life Saving and the International Federation of Swimming Teachers. Through these we can learn from other country's lifesaving organisations and how they approach the teaching of swimming and water-rescue and promote water safety awareness. In return, other countries gain valuable experience and information from us concerning our approach to the promotion of water safety as an island nation.

During 2006, I was very concerned at the number of drownings that are occurring around our coast, especially among "non nationals" and including drowning accidents that have resulted within our indigenous fishing industry. On behalf of Irish Water Safety I extend to the bereaved families of those who died our sincere and deepest sympathy. Irish Water Safety has issued several Press Release concerning fishing off rocks and this has been picked by many "non national" columns in circulation here in Ireland and abroad. We have been in touch with International Life Saving seeking their help in notifying visitors and migrant workers to our country of the dangers of our seas compared to what they may normally be use to in their own countries. We will do our utmost to improve safety regimes for our offshore fishermen through our good working relationships with the many national maritime bodies we work closely with. Irish Water Safety continues to address loss of life through suicidal drownings and we have in place ongoing studies in this regard. We thank the ESB for the financial support they have given to us to address this issue.

This year, as we do every year in Dublin Castle, we honoured those who have given exceptional voluntary service to Irish Water Safety. We also acknowledged the kind sponsorships and supports that we received from many sources, which are substantial. Through the Seiko "Just in Time Awards" we acknowledged those who placed their lives on the line to rescue others in distress in water. We take this opportunity to congratulate all recipients on their fine achievements and kind sponsorships of our Organisation.

Irish Water Safety continues to have a very close relationship with Local Authorities and this we maintain through the Water Safety Development Officers who are members of Irish Water Safety on their appointment. We carryout risk assessments, pool and beach lifeguard training and testing and in general advise local authorities on matters of water safety and rescue. In return we receive financial support from all Local Authorities, which if we did not get would raise a question of sustainability in continuing with many of our programmes. Other financial support comes from several other sources including Central Government (especially the Department of

the Environment, Heritage & Local Government), fundraising by our members and the many businesses, firms and other voluntary organisations that give so generously to assist with programs and activities in the promotion of water safety.

I wish to thank our Medical Advisor, Dr. Tony Handley for the expert medical advice he has given us throughout the year. I wish to thank our Chief Executive Officer, the Marketing Manager, the Officer Manager and the other members of Staff for their dedication and loyalty throughout 2006. Theirs is a vital role in supporting the efforts of the various groupings and members nationwide.

On a personal note, I express my thanks to my colleagues on the Council for their fine contribution to the promotion of water safety awareness during 2006. I know they will join with me in reflecting on the year with satisfaction, in the knowledge, that we have promoted water safety to the best of our ability. I thank all the voluntary members who give of their time so generously towards the work of the various Commissions and at local level.

I do wish to mention the exceptional high profile that Irish Water Safety has and is sustaining through the kindness of the various Press, Radio, TV and other media outlets. We thank them for their kind support and we acknowledge their commitment to saving life through their kind cooperation with us, which has never faltered over many years – Thank You!

Finally, I extend the thanks of all members of Irish Water Safety to the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, Mr. Dick Roche, T.D. who has been most supportive of our efforts in promoting water safety. We thank also other Ministers and Ministers of State who have taken time to be available to us to launch projects or present awards. Special thanks to the Secretary General, Mr. Callan and Assistant Secretary, Ms. G. Tallon and Staff Members of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, who gave assistance to the Council throughout the year 2006.

Water Safety Area Committees


The organisation has thirty Area Committees, arranged almost on a county basis plus the Defence Forces and the Gárda Siochana Water Safety Area Committees. Much recognition must be afforded to these Water Safety Area Committees who devise a programme of events and courses to cover their areas for the year. In addition to delivering water safety promotional programmes and demonstrations at schools, colleges, businesses, exhibitions and community events, each Committee delivers an extensive programme of pool water safety sessions in the winter and beach, lake and river water safety sessions in the summer.

The official membership structure is of a voluntary nature with over one thousand five hundred members nationwide. It operates on a number of different levels: Life Governors, Examiners, Trainee Examiners, Tutors, Instructors, Trainee Instructors and Non-Technical Volunteer Organisers. Each Local Authority has a Water Safety Development Officer who is a member of Irish Water Safety.

Thanks to all their efforts to promote water safety we have seen a significant increase in the development of water safety awareness in local communities.

There are two broad categories of certification – Swimming and Lifesaving. Our Swim certificates are issued directly to and accounted for by Area Committees. The overall number of Swim certificates is significant and continues to grow reflecting the efforts of our voluntary members who instil water confidence and deep-water swimming ability in thousands of people every year. In recent years, these are accounted for at local level.

SEIKO Just in Time Award

Garda Jason Clarke, Roscommon

Garda Jason Clarke who was on foot patrol noticed a woman in distress in the river Corrib at O'Briens Bridge, Galway where the water flow is fast and treacherous. Jason, a trained Lifeguard, entered the water and brought the woman to safety on the bank, where he received welcome assistance to take her to an awaiting ambulance.

Garda Nigel McInaw, Louth

On 17th May 2005 at 3am, Garda Nigel McInaw entered the fast flowing and treacherous river Boyne at St Mary's Bridge, Drogheda and rescued a young woman who had fallen into the water.

Fergal Caffrey, Dublin Kevin O'Brien, Dublin Sean Ivory, Dublin

Kevin O'Brien, Sean Ivory and Fergal Caffrey, staff of the Eastern Fisheries Board were returning to Howth harbour from a coastal sea patrol when a woman was spotted lying face down in the water. Sean Ivory went into the water and swam to the woman and brought her to the fisheries Patrol Craft; Fergal and Kevin pulled her into the boat where she regained consciousness and was taken ashore to refuge.

Pat Gleeson, Kilkenny

While holidaying in Torremolinos, Pat Gleeson noticed two girls in distress in the water at the beach. Without hesitation Pat entered the water along with another gentleman and brought the two girls to safety through strong surf conditions.

Sarah Meehan, Donegal Philip McAvoy, Armagh

On 26th August 2006 at 7pm, Sarah Meehan observed a man in difficulty in the water at Creevy Pier, Ballyshannon. She took a ring buoy and swam 50 meters from shore to the man in difficulty. Sarah used her lifesaving skills to calm the subject and keep him afloat until Philip McAvoy observed the incident and swam out to assist Sarah. They both used an arm carry and side stroke to successfully take the subject ashore and treat him for shock, until he was taken by ambulance to Sligo General Hospital.

Mel McCarthy, Laois

On the 4th August 2004, Mel swam to two girls who got into difficulty due to heavy surf conditions at Tramore beach, Co Waterford. He managed to bring one girl to safety while his friend went to rescue the other girl until he too got into difficulty. Mel went back out to assist his friend while a lifequard rescued the other girl. All three survived.

Eamonn Murray, Wicklow

Patrick O'Brien, Wicklow

On Wednesday 19th July 2006 an incident took place at Blessington lake where a family of four were fishing and their boat capsized. Two people including an uncle of the family, watching from the shore plunged into the water in a desperate bid to rescue them. Patrick and Eamonn received calls notifying them of the incident and they immediately went to the scene where they successfully rescued all six.

Ciaran O'Reilly, Cavan

On the 18th June 2006 Ciaran noticed a woman in distress in the water at Belturbet, Co. Cavan. He immediately dived into the water and swam towards the semi conscious woman and brought her to safety where Basic Life Support was administered by Ciaran's wife and Garda Siobhan Campbell. She was then taken to Cavan General Hospital for treatment. Without the guick thinking and courageous action of Ciaran the outcome may have been very tragic.

John Madden, Offalv

John and his friend were duck shooting on the river Shannon near Banagher when his boat capsized. John climbed onto the over turned boat and held onto his companion. With his free hand he called for help on his mobile phone. John held onto his companion for over an hour in icy waters until emergency services rescued both of them. It is without doubt John's great strength and prompt action that saved both himself and the life of his companion.

Rescue Appreciation Award

David Cox, Laois

David came to the rescue of his neighbour in July of 2006 when she got into difficulty and started choking on a piece of meat - he immediately began back slaps until the obstruction came up. Thanks to the IWS courses David had undertaken he was able to respond quickly and professionally to save this lady's life.

Kerri Anne Cully, Cavan Siobhan O'Hara, Cavan

On 9th October 2005 an accident occurred on the Main Street in Arva involving a motorbike and lorry. Siobhan & Kerry used their knowledge of spinal injuries learned at IWS courses to take control of the situation and administer first aid, keeping the young man comfortable until the ambulance and local Doctor arrived. The ambulance crew praised them for their endeavours.

I have audited the financial statements of Irish Water Safety for the year ended 31st December 2006 under the Comptroller and Auditor General (Amendment) Act 1993.

The financial statements, which have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein, comprise the Statement of Accounting Policies, the Income and Expenditure Account, the Statement of Total Recognised Gains and Losses, the Balance Sheet and the related notes.

Respective Responsibilities of the Council and the Comptroller and Auditor General

Irish Water Safety is responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with the Irish Water Safety (Establishment) Order 2006, and for ensuring the regularity of transactions. Irish Water Safety prepares the financial statements in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland. The accounting responsibilities of the Members of the Council are set out in the Statement of the Responsibilities of the Council.

My responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

I report my opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view, in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland. I also report whether in my opinion proper books of account have been kept. In addition, I state whether the financial statements are in agreement with the books of account.

I report any material instance where moneys have not been applied for the purposes intended or where the transactions do not conform to the authorities governing them.

I also report if I have not obtained all the information and explanations necessary for the purposes of my audit.

I review whether the Statement on Internal Financial Control reflects the body's compliance with the Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies and report any material instance where it does not do so, or if the statement is misleading or inconsistent with other information of which I am aware from my audit of the financial statements. I am not required to consider whether the Statement on Internal Financial Control covers all financial risks and controls, or to form an opinion on the effectiveness of the risk and control procedures.

I read other information contained in the Annual Report, and consider whether it is consistent with the audited financial statements. I consider the implications for my report if I become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the financial statements.

Basis of Audit Opinion

In the exercise of my function as Comptroller and Auditor General, I conducted my audit of the financial statements in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board and by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures and regularity of the financial transactions included in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgments made in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the body's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

I planned and performed my audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations that I considered necessary in order to provide me with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming my opinion I also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In my opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view, in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland, of the state of Irish Water Safety's affairs at 31st December 2006 and of its income and expenditure for the year then ended.

In my opinion, proper books of account have been kept by Irish Water Safety. The financial statements are in agreement with the books of account.

Statement of Responsibilities of the Council of Irish Water Safety

Irish Water Safety was established on 24th July 2006 by the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government under the Irish Water Safety Establishment Order 2006 (S.I. 389 of 2006). The order re-established the former Irish Water Safety Association as a corporate body under its new title "Irish Water Safety" and expanded the services to be provided by the body. Notwithstanding the revised Statutory Instrument under which the body now operates, these financial statements cover the period 1st January 2006 to 31st December 2006.

Irish Water Safety is required to prepare financial statements, in the form approved by the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, with the consent of the Minister for Finance, which give a true and fair view of its state of affairs and income and expenditure for the period. In preparing the financial statements, Irish Water Safety is required to:

- 1. Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- 2. Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- 3. State whether any applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.
- 4. Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that Irish Water Safety will continue in operation.

The Council is responsible for keeping proper books of account, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of Irish Water Safety and which enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Irish Water Safety Establishment Order 2006. The Council is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of Irish Water Safety, and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Statement on Internal Financial Control

Responsibility for the system of Internal Financial Control

On behalf of the Council of Irish Water Safety, I acknowledge our responsibility for ensuring that an effective system of internal financial control is maintained and operated.

The system can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected in a timely period.

Key Control Procedures

The Council has taken steps to ensure an appropriate control environment by;

- Clearly defining management responsibilities;
- Establishing formal procedures for reporting significant control failures and ensuring appropriate corrective action.

In December 2005 the Council established a formal process to identify and evaluate business risk by;

- Identifying the nature, extent and financial implication of risks facing the body including the extent and categories which it regards as acceptable;
- Assessing the likelihood of identified risks occurring;
- Assessing the body's ability to manage and mitigate the risks that do occur;
- Assessing the costs of operating particular controls relative to the benefit obtained.

In 2006 the Finance Commission carried out this exercise and reported to the Council.

The system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information, administrative procedures including segregation of duties, and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular it includes:

- A budgeting system with an annual budget which is reviewed and agreed by the Council;
- Regular reviews by the Council of periodic and annual financial reports which indicate financial performance against forecast;
- Setting targets to measure financial and other performance.

In December of 2001, the Council established a Finance Commission consisting of three nonexecutive and two executive members and that Commission reviews internal control matters and issues raised by the Comptroller and Auditor General. At present Irish Water Safety does not have an internal audit function. A sub-committee of the Council, i.e. the Finance Commission carries out the analysis of risk.

The Council's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal financial control had in the past been based on the work of the Financial Officer and CEO who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of an appropriate financial control framework. The Council will continue to seek the input of the Financial Officer and CEO on this matter and will also rely upon reports and comments made by the Finance Commission and the Comptroller and Auditor General in his management letter or other reports.

Annual Review of Controls

The Council and Finance Commission headed by me as Chairman, with the full cooperation of the Chief Executive Officer and the Financial Officer, both of whom have been designated by the Council to ensure that the necessary controls are in place, review these controls on a continual basis in line with any directions received. One of the non-executive members of the Finance Commission has been appointed as an independent reviewer/examiner of Internal Financial Controls. His function is to report back to the Finance Commission and the Council on the appropriateness and correctness of the standards of internal financial control to date in place. We confirm that in the year ended 31 December 2006 the Council has conducted a review of the effectiveness of the systems of internal financial control.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, under the accruals method of accounting except as stated below and in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice. The statements are in a form approved by the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, with the consent of the Minister for Finance, under the Irish Water Safety Establishment Order 2006 (S.I. 389 of 2006).

Period of Accounts

The financial statements cover the 12 month period to 31st December 2006.

Income

Oireachtas Grants represent the actual cash receipts in the year.

Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed Assets are shown at cost. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis as follows:

Leasehold Improvements	21 years
Office Equipment	5 years
Computer Equipment	3 years

Artworks donated to Irish Water Safety over a number of years were valued by an independent valuer during 2006 and have been included in the financial statement at this valuation. Artworks are not depreciated, as the Council believes that they are unlikely to suffer a loss in value.

Capital Account

The capital account represents the unamortised value of income used for capital purposes.

Pensions

Under the Irish Water Safety Establishment Order 2006, schemes and regulations made under the Local Government (Superannuation) Act 1980 (No. 8 of 1980) apply to Irish Water Safety as if it were a Local Authority.

Irish Water Safety operates a defined benefits scheme which is funded annually on a pay as you go basis from monies available to it, including monies provided by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government and from contributions deducted from staff salaries.

Pension costs reflect pension benefits earned by employees in the period and are shown net of staff pension contributions which are retained by Irish Water Safety. An amount corresponding to the pension charge is recognised as income to the extent that it is recoverable and offset by grants received in the year to discharge pension payments.

Actuarial gains or losses arising on scheme liabilities are reflected in the Statement of Total Recognised Gains and Losses and a corresponding adjustment is recognised in the amount recoverable from the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government.

Pension liabilities represent the present value of future pension payments earned by staff to date. Deferred pension funding represents the corresponding asset to be recovered in future periods from the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government.

Water Safety Committees

Committees, which are responsible for the organisation of water safety activities at local level, undertake local fundraising activities for which Irish Water Safety sets targets. Fundraising income is retained by the Water Safety Committees to finance local activities. Financial transactions of these Committees are not incorporated into these accounts.

d. Deferred Funding Asset for Pensions

Irish Water Safety recognises these amounts as an asset corresponding to the unfunded deferred liability for pensions on the basis of the set of assumptions described above and a number of past events. These events include the statutory basis for the establishment of the superannuation scheme, and the policy and practice currently in place in relation to funding public service pensions including contributions by employees and the annual estimates process. While there is no formal agreement regarding these specific amounts with the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, Irish Water Safety has no evidence that this funding policy will not continue to meet such sums in accordance with current practice. The deferred funding asset for pensions as at 31 December 2006 amounted to \notin 260,000 (2005: \notin 210,000).

Note 10. Lease Commitments

As at 31^{st} December 2006, Irish Water Safety has annual commitments in respect of an operating lease for the premises it occupies at Long Walk, Galway, under a lease for 21 years, which commenced in July 2000. No interest payments were made under the terms of the regulations in 2006 or 2005.

Drowning Statistics 2006

IWS maintains a comprehensive database of drowning incidents in Ireland. This database is constantly updated using information provided by the Central Statistics Office (CSO), An Garda Siochána and extracts from national and local media. Tragically in the year 2006 there were a total of 131 drownings.
